A Report on the Trip to Bharatpur

The boys of the Junior House went for a invigorating trip to the historically strategic town, Fatehpur Sikri in U.P. followed by an inevitable visit to Bharatpur Bird Sanctuary in Rajasthan and the eventful outing culminated at Crocodile Breeding Centre near Chambal River in M.P.

This educational tour from 13th to 14th July 2017 delighted everyone. The boys came to know that Fatehpur Sikri is situated in the upper portion of the Vindhya mountain ranges. Babar, the founder of the Mughal Dynasty and Akbar's grandfather, had won a battle over there when he defeated Rana Sanga of Mewar. In gratitude, he named the area Shukri, which means "thanks". The city was known as Sikrigrah and it was built by Maharaja Sangram Singh who was the last emperor of the Rajput reign. It is regarded as one of the most important buildings amongst a list of World Heritage Structures, which has been brought forward by UNESCO.

The boys were awestruck as they saw the complex, which was made up mostly of sandstone. The palatial complex consists of several pavilions which are arranged geometrically as per the tent formations in Arabic nations.

Next, the boys got up early in the morning to visit Bharatpur Bird Sanctuary. During the breeding season, the most spectacular heronry in the region is formed by 15 species of herons, ibis, cormorants, spoonbills and storks, where in a well-flooded year over 20,000 birds nest. It was a pleasure to see cranes, swan, herons etc. The boys were accompanied by expert guides who briefed them about the topography of the place along with important inputs pertaining to birds and animals that frequent the place.



While returning back to School, the last stop was at the Crocodile Breeding Centre near Chambal River. The boys showed a keen interest and asked pertinent questions as they went around looking at the alligators and crocodiles. The adventurous two days' outing was profusely enjoyed by the boys and the interactive sessions were enjoyed to the hilt by one and all.

A Report on the Visit to CERN Laboratory

Ms Niharika Kulshresth, Physics Faculty member of the School was selected by CERN for the three weeks' High School Teacher Programme from 1st - 22nd July 2017. 43 teachers from 34 countries attended the programme, which entailed 100 hours of lectures, visits to research facilities and Question & Answer and Discussion Sessions. In addition to this, the programme included 24 hours of activity in the work group 'Gender Inclusive Teaching of Physics'. The work group presented its final report on the penultimate day of the Teacher Programme.

Every year, CERN offers various professional development programmes for teachers to keep themselves up-to-date with the latest developments in Particle

Physics and related areas, experiencing a dynamic and international research environment. All programmes are facilitated by experts in the field of physics, engineering, and computing.

Founded in 1954, the CERN laboratory is on the Franco-Swiss border near Geneva. It was one of Europe's first joint ventures to promote Science for peaceful purpose and now has 22 member states.

At CERN, the European Organization for Nuclear Research, physicists and engineers are probing the fundamental structure of the universe. They use the world's largest and most complex scientific instruments to study the basic constituents of matter – the fundamental particles. The particles are made to collide at a speed which is close to the speed of light. The process gives the physicists clues about how the particles interact, and provides insights into the fundamental laws of nature.

The instruments used at CERN for this purpose are particle accelerators and detectors. Accelerators speed up beams of particles to high energies and then the beams are made to collide with each other or with stationary targets. Detectors observe and analyse the results of these collisions.

It is getting a 100% scholarship, all the way to Germany, what a student learning the German language aspires for, I would say. This opportunity is very limited out of all, such as the few one would get in a lifetime. Eeshan Agrawal and I were the two recipients of this scholarship to Sankt Peter Ording, Germany, for the year 2017-18. During my flight hours, I kept on continuously meditating over my stay with the people who communed and transacted their daily communication in a language which was still foreign to me, as all I had transacted in that language was the communication I had made in the German class at my school. Three countries other than India- Vietnam, Singapore and Thailand were a part of this Camp. I met people from India itself, those who too were here on the same scholarship. I opined that this Camp would be extremely helpful in refining one's language skills.

Our arrival, here at Sankt Peter Ording, was a distinctive one as our Camp coordinators welcomed us with several gifts and other such presents such as chocolates which fascinated and won our hearts. "Ice-breaking", is what they call 'mixing up', a motive which underlines all camps organized by them. We were provided with different tasks to perform, with unfamiliar faces around us to work with. It all turned out to be of huge worth in the long run.

The first week of our stay commenced in full swing with our German classes scheduled from 9:00 am in the morning till 2:00 p.m. in the afternoon with a 15-minutes' break included. Meals were not a major issue with us as they served the vegetarian course in the pause sessions or breaks. Evenings were way off different as the sun had made all the difference. "Abendrunde", the meaning of which is similar to 'an evening gathering' was cherished by all of us as the student company chorused the anthem, "Menschen Leben TanzenWelt", the song sung at the Camp. Going to bed made us all excited for we received the Wi-Fi code only once in the whole day to access the internet. Days passed on but each morning started with a new phase of learning. The activities were the most attention- grabbing part of the entire camp for each evening lent itself to uniqueness. Our visit to their state-of-the-art, in-house swimming pool was one of my favourite haunts in the entire school. The appearance of artificial waves generated by a machine to give the feel of a beach to the onlooker was a sight to behold. Enjoying the terrific water rides was another major attraction of the place. As we stayed for three weeks, all the three "Fridays" were the special and the most awaited ones. The 'Black and White party', followed by the 'Flirt party' and the 'Betreur Abend' (Volunteer's night) cannot be compared to anything else in the world as the fun and thrill that I experienced during these were incomparable. From the shopping of grocery items from the supermarkets to asking directions and locations on the streets of Germany, everything made us so comfortable with the language that it dawned on us that we could talk in the language with such felicity. The Germans believe that India is a harbour to the diverse cultures that exemplify 'unity in diversity' and we proved it right by showcasing some wonderful dance performances which gave a panoptic

view of our tradition and culture. Each country had beautifully presented their own lifestyle and culture during the programme. Germans have a policy of celebrating their weekends with much zest and cheerfulness and so we were taken to Husum and Hamburg cities. Husum is a small city situated near Sankt Peter Ording. Here at Husum, we visited a huge sea aquarium and afterwards appeared for an observation test taken by the organisers to check whether we actually paid attention to it or just passed by it. Hamburg is populated with old – fashioned monuments such as- *Rathaus* (German Parliament). As a stark contrast to these ancient buildings, the city also holds a super-modern shopping hub which stretches for a great length along the roadside. Tired with the usual cuisine, we were given some tasty pizzas to tickle our taste buds. Interviewing people in the streets and putting some daily life questions to them was indeed a memorable experience! Treasure hunts, Capture the Flag and indoor games such as 'Halli Galli' was all that we did in our leisure time.

Subsequently, the second week came to an end. The third week began with much zeal and excitement as our last few days were left and no one knew what would be in store for us once the camp ended, for the reason that we had bonded so well! Everything seemed as if it had just started off, thus, making everyone wish that it would never end. In the previous weeks, we had done various projects like start-ups, recycling items, gaining knowledge about some well-known food around the town and photo story. All of this was something new and important to learn, as each of these projects had its own relevance and taught us how things worked here at Germany. Moreover, we drove to Kiel, a city 350 kms. away from our campus. This place had its own sparkle; for though we visited it with some other purpose in our mind but during the bus journeys it captivated us with the scenic beauty which was worth capturing. Studying in Germany was our motive and in addition to it we went to a university which freed us from all our doubts and satiated the queries which we Indians had as international students, regarding the admission procedures. Wandering around the campus and meeting students was helpful and inspiring as many of us explored the possibility of opting for further studies in Germany at the university level. Night walks to the light house in the gusty winds, playing football with the Germans and defeating them though it never mattered who won or lost, was all what we looked for and made good friends and I think we did just that. The Ladakh Service Project and Trekking Expedition

The Scindia School, for the second time in a row, organized the Regional (South Asia & Gulf) Round Square Service Project at Thiksey village in Ladakh from 25th June - 10th July 2017. 31 students and 8 adults from 11 schools participated in the service project and trekking expedition. Volunteers arrived from the length and breadth of the country and also from a couple of countries in Europe as well. The schools which participated in this venture were: The Shri Ram School – Aravali, The Lawrence School – Lovedale, Vivek High School – Chandigarh, Mayo College – Ajmer, Pinegrove School – Solan, The Dhirubhai Ambani International School – Mumbai, The Daly College – Indore, Mody School – Lakshmangarh, Landheim Schondorf – Germany, Aiglon College – Switzerland and of course the host school, The Scindia School. Apart from service, the venture also included a very challenging trekking expedition. Mr Tony Hyde, Honorary Member - Round Square was the Project Mentor.

Delegates started this venture on the 25th of June, with the first two days exclusively dedicated to the acclimatization process coupled with an introduction to Ladakh's rich culture, geography and wildlife through some interesting documentaries which were shown at the hotel -Ladakh Residency. The hotel was comfortable, offered delegates a splendid view of the mountains and employed some of the nicest people as staff members. After a relaxed first day, we went out of the hotel on the second day and climbed several hundreds of stairs to the Shanti Stupa which is a Buddhist temple in Leh district. This temple was gifted by the Japanese and has a beautiful architecture. After spending some time at the Shanti Stupa, we walked around the periphery of Leh which almost took around three hours before we returned to the hotel for lunch. This outing not only served the purpose of sight-seeing but prepared us for what was in the offing in the next 15 days. In the evening, the delegates assembled in the seminar hall of the hotel where they were assigned into 6 groups which stuck together for the next fifteen days. An unending list of safety instructions and a general code of conduct was delivered to all the delegates the same evening.

Delegates reached the Thiksey village on the 27th of June and were taken by surprise on arrival. This was because Ladakh residency had all the modern amenities as compared to the *Ladakhi* toilets and bath areas which were rather basic at the campsite. The campsite was situated at a distance of a fifteen minute walk from the worksite -Lamdon School's campus, where we eventually built the two rooms. For the next one week we worked for six hours daily in harsh sun and finally built two rooms for office usage at the

LamdonModel School. Work was extremely tough initially. Carrying heavy bricks, sacks of cement and wooden beams made our bodies sore until our muscles got used to the workload. Delegates worked in groups and took turns when it came to performing each task. During our breaks at the work site, particularly during afternoons, the delegates interacted with the children and played Volleyball and Badminton and took some classes as well. Due to these interactions between the delegates and the *Ladakhi* children,all the gaps, cultural, social or economic that may have existed between the delegates and the *Ladakhi* children disappeared in a very short span of time.

Before we embarked on our next challenge - the trekking expedition, we visited the breathtakingly beautiful Pangong lake which was a memorable experience for all. Its beauty is simply inexplicable. A surprise meeting with His Holiness, the 14th Dalai Lama on his birthday, the 6th of July was an inexplicable spiritual experience which made the entire Ladakh trip all the more worthwhile. Both these experiences, that is the visit to the heavenly Pangong lake and meeting H.H. Dalai Lama were 'once in a lifetime opportunities for all of us'.

Second part of the Ladakh venture was the Trekking Expedition. On day one, we started the trek from Zinchen and it took us about four hours to reach our uphill destination - Rumbak village. We camped here for the next two nights, right in the midst of the raw beauty of Ladakh. A tributary of the Indus flowed calmly close to our campsite when we reached there in the afternoon. But by evening, I realized that it was a temperamental beast. During the day its turquoise waters glided peacefully mirroring the Zen-like surroundings. However, by evening, the river gushed wildly over rocks, as if in defiance of the calm around. I was told by an accompanying guide that this is the impact of the day's sunlight which melts the snow and hence the evening heavy flow.On day two, our trek was from Rumbak to Kandala Pass and back. We started at 9.15 a.m. and returned to our camp at 7.15 p.m., making it perhaps one of the most demanding treks that one could ever do in a single day. Most members achieved the commendable feat of trekking up to the summit of Kandala Pass which is at a height of approximately 5000 Meters from the sea level. The view of the world from the summit cannot easily be put in words. The next morning, we trekked downhill from Rumbak to Zinchen to the point where we were received by the hotel vehicles and were driven to the hotel just in time for lunch which ended our Ladakh sojourn.

In the end, I would like to share some of the key takeaways that the delegates

After spending the, 'Where the hell did they go?' 2017 Delhi winters in the gym followed by miles after miles of putting one leg ahead of the other in the April heat of the capital's roads, 6:14.09 was my official time at Ironman Western Australia in the scenic town 200km South-West of Perth, Busselton. Busselton, a town known for its iconic 2km long jetty that is southern hemisphere's longest, played host to the race that is known for its strong participation, flat seaside route and frequent shark sightings. Yeap! that last one is true as well, and freakishly, it happened again this year. But thankfully, the shark was in no mood for Indian curry masala and thus turned up 10 minutes after I had finished the swim. I was told later that those still swimming had to be brought back to the beach on a boat. What happened to their race? I am not sure.

After the hot and humid Ironman Indonesia in August, I had been looking forward to a cool weather race at the peak of Delhi summers. Thus, opting for Southern Hemisphere was a no brainer. So Australia became the 2nd destination in my endeavour to compete in all 6 continents. The race day morning was cold and windy, exactly the kind of weather I hoped for. The only downside about the beginning for me (and our age group) was the late start of our wave of athletes. Late start meant the sun was already in its full force by the time we entered the ocean. So during the swim sighting became an issue as looking in the direction of the sharp sun hampered visibility and sense of direction. I relied on proximity to other swimmers to reassure myself if I was going in the right direction. The bike leg was a scenic 2 lap route next to the sea and through the nearby forests. With smooth roads, the bike was leg was a comfortable stretch. The second transition for the run was much quicker and I felt strong going into the run. I remember in Indonesia I was extremely tired by the time I reached T2, but I carried on only because I did not want a 'DNF' against my name. The run leg was 3 loops of a circuit on the beach. With families of competitors cheering everybody, the legs didn't feel so heavy. I remember a few posters which made me laugh while running 'If Trump can run, so can you', 'If you collapse, I will pause your Garmin', 'Waking up early to make this poster wasn't easy either' and 'This seems to be a lot of hard work for a free banana'. Finally, I arrived at the finish chute where I picked up the Indian flag from my friend who had been waiting patiently all this while and ran straight to the

finish as the announcer, who we had chatted a lot pre-race, said those magical words "Ajay Poonia, you are an Ironman".

Though I wasn't particularly impressed with performance, especially the bike leg as heavy winds and what I believe was less than optimal pressure in the tyres, I could only shave off my personal best by 1 minute. As far as the overall position is concerned, the field here was much bigger and stronger than Indonesia, with athletes donning the colours of the Triclubs of not just the cities but of their neighbourhoods(!), and so I could just about manage to be in the top-400 amongst more than 1800 athletes. As the adrenaline of being a 2x Ironman settled down, I posed with the national flag on my shoulders for a few pictures and went straight to the recovery area looking for the masseuse and a free banana.



A Report on the Debating Workshop

Akash Jaini (Ex- Ja 2016) and Shantanu Kulshreshtha (Ex- Ja 2016) conducted a debating workshop in School from Friday, 14th July to Sunday, 16th July. They drilled children in the Oxford, Cambridge and Parliamentary styles of debating. The participants were familiarised with the minutiae of each format and the debating jargon peculiar to each. The technical terms were simplified for the purpose of effectiveness in developing cogent arguments. One session was devoted exclusively to get children initiated into alternate ways of approaching a motion. Mock drills made all the theoretical knowledge alive for our boys. In addition to active debating the participants were also made to adjudicate so as to get a better understanding of speaker roles and the flow of the debate. The boys of Junior House were introduced to the Oxford format and they too went through a mock session. The workshop threw up some promising and upcoming debaters and three rigorous sessions were held exclusively with them for greater practice. The boys found the sessions very enriching and could be seen flocking around the resource persons for clarifying doubts and queries. 
