Dear Readers,

After a long time, I have the opportunity to write the editorial for the long lasting tradition of the Scindia School, the Review. While I was contemplating on various issues that exist in the world today, I was struck by an idea, a thought, in the middle of my reflection. In the thoughtful and pensive mood that I was in, I started asking myself- Are we free on this planet in the most real sense? I'm not too sure of it. With no reference to any context, I would like to talk about the freedom of expression and the freedom of honest opinion and then relate it with our school at a micro level. One must also realise and accept that if we let loose the freedom of expression, people might take it for granted and thus violate and enter into personal spaces of individuals. So, a person should nail and understand the limit and must know how far they can go. We must be fearless in expressing our opinion and must respect different perspectives and opinions. In a modern society, it becomes very important for people to respect open and constructive debates. Various tools like Open House and panel discussions help in understanding the various aspects of the same issue. While one must put forth their opinions, they must respect and construe the other side as well.

It is interesting that 15th of March is celebrated as 'World day of Silence', as well as the 'Day of Dialogue'. I want you to focus on the two contradictory terms that come together in this; 'silence' and 'dialogue'. But before I venture onto what I derive from the juxtaposition of these two words, I would request you to lay your eyes upon a poem by Kyle J. Carruthers and surmise on how silence is an adventure into an unknown mental space:

Silence is an absence, *Silence* is profound, Silence is a conversation, Being had without sound, Silence is an expression, One that cannot be heard, Silence cannot be spoken, Although it is a word, Silence is a presence, Of great nothingness, Silence can be something, And yet cease to exist, Silence can fill a room, And have no mass at all, Silence cannot be dropped, yet it can fall. Silence is a mystery, That will forever go unsolved. Silence is how every sound can swiftly be dissolved, Silence is the sound of rest. The only sound that can sound best,

While other sounds can cause great pain. Silence is not the sound to blame, For Silence is what silence is, Something that is nothing, Nothing that exists.

So to prolong this thought, if speech is silver, silence is golden. If we go back to our ancient practice of recognizing and exercising the value of silence, I think, many trials and tribulations will shed the mammoth grief and pain attached to them and not be invincible.

In ancient India, the practice of vowing to be silent prevailed. We live in a world in which people who converse more are considered to be confident. But we must ask ourselves if there is truly a relation between success and empty talk. In ancient India, the practice of not talking at certain periods of time was considered to meet a two-fold objective. When the otherwise, incessant thoughts and words ceased, they made us focus on the insides of us. Secondly, the energy conserved could be put to more productive use. Certainly, it is important that we must watch not only our actions and thoughts but the expression of those thoughts as well. It reminds me of a four liner which I heard through somebody - "If of life you keep a care, five things observe with care, of what you talk, of whom you talk, when, and what and where."

Next, I would like you to delve deeper into the meaning of celebrating Women's Day as just one day in our lives. The very status of women has got enhanced due to the courage shown by educated women who could break the ice, express their freedom and hence conceptualise a society in which we presently live. There is no internal process which takes place; one has to put forth his/her constructive opinion against all odds.

J. Raymond has rightly written of this woman who has refused to submit and who has chalked out the course of her life:

Slightly battered, deeply bruised, and tired of the strained days. Certainly she had the right to give up, or give in, to toss out whatever fight she had left within. But she refused, She knew it to be a fool's fate to quit after she'd made it this far. And she instead, felt compelled to pick herself back up, brush the dust off her spirits, and with the slightest of smiles, decided that this place, right here, this space is the perfect place to start this story from. The story of who she should become.

The quality of separating the untruth from the truth comes by virtue of sheer practice. As the celebrated Sherlock Holmes, speaks in the story, 'The Adventure of Beryl Coronet':

It is an old maxim of mine that when you have excluded the impossible, whatever remains, however improbable must be the truth.

To conclude, I would like to reiterate the fact that silence is a quality to be cultivated and school life is the best to develop this habit. We must also keep in mind that the attribute of being able to accommodate and give space to women in our lives, professionally as well as in the familial space, is the prime responsibility of all. I would like you to leave with the thought that society progresses only by aberration.
