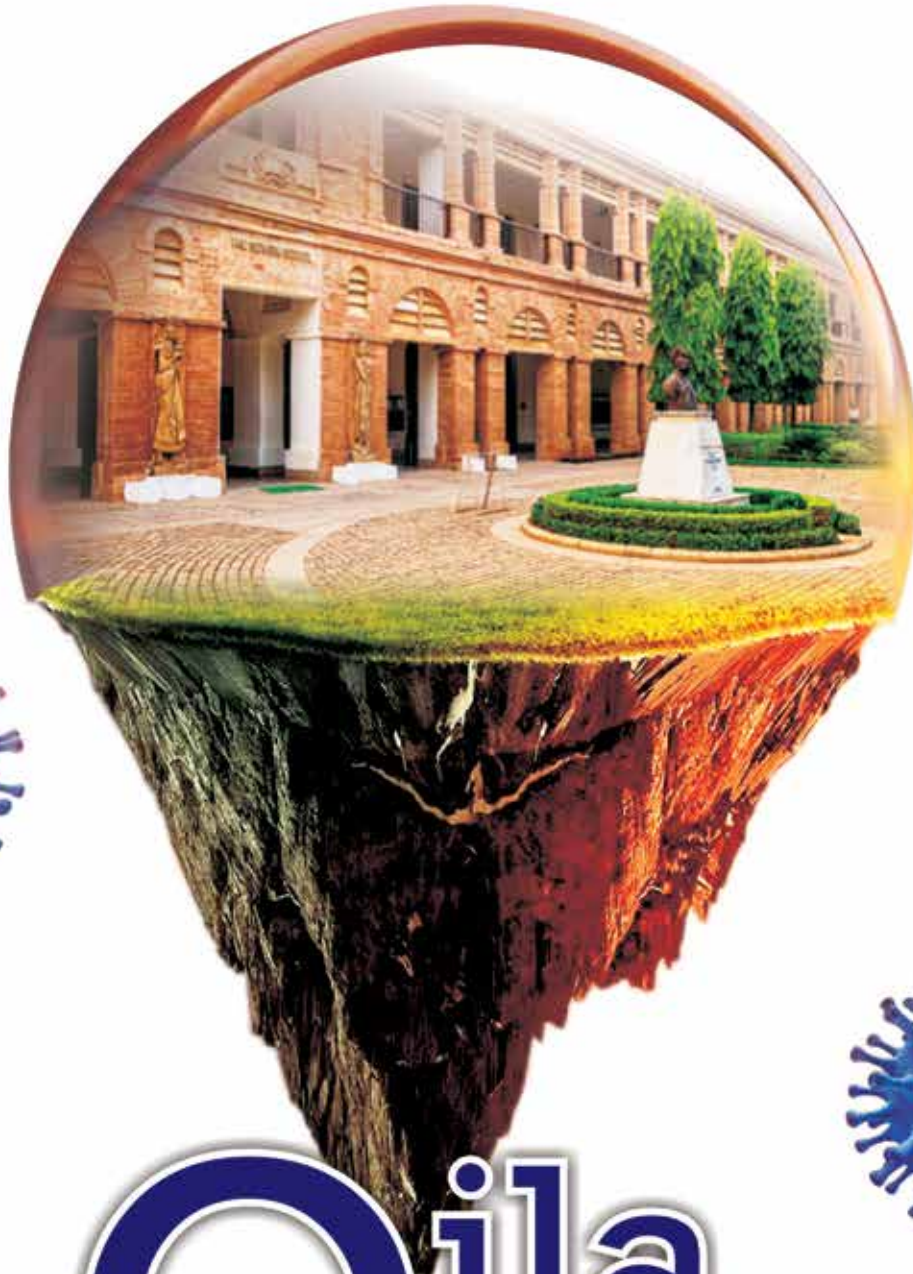

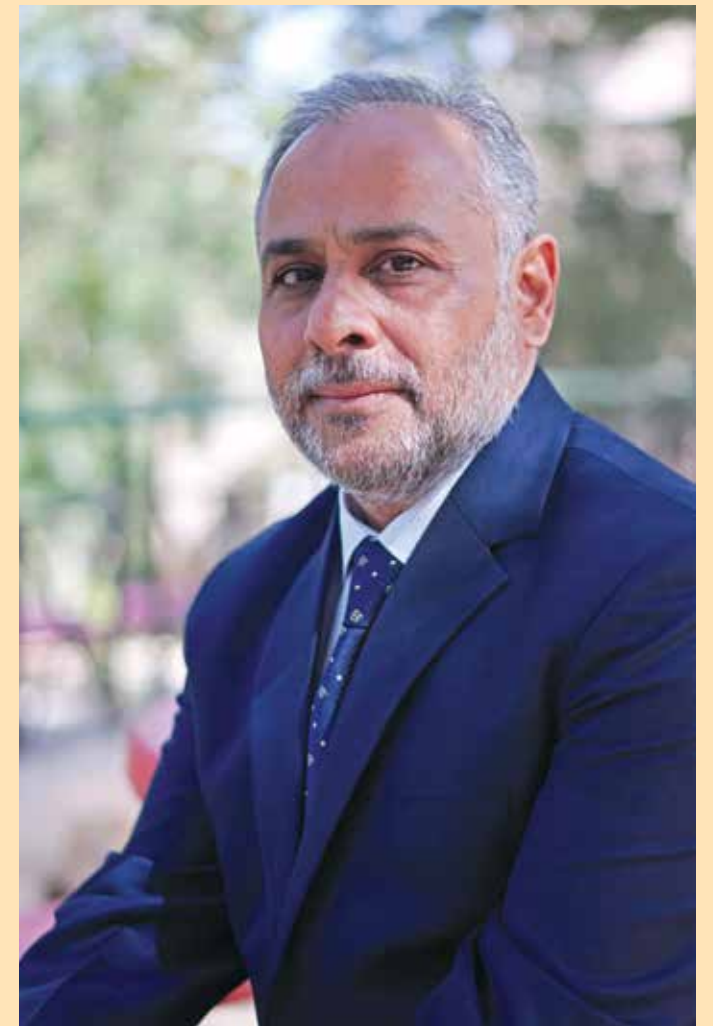

EDITORIAL

We have received more than 85% of our children back into the portals of the school once again with all enthusiasm and necessary precautions. Right from the movement of the staff to the parking of vehicles, to the accommodation of the service staff inside the campus; nothing has been left to chance. We have accommodated students not Housewise but Classwise to reduce intermingling of boys across classes for further safety. We have hired an outside agency - 'Momentum India' which has helped us put stringent protocols in place for all categories of staff & students with every minute detail. Additional security personnel have been deployed to man the entry-exit points. Our priority now is Academics, Wellbeing, and Safety of our children. Students who have finished their quarantine period are now engaging in noncontact sports and fitness training.

Academics

The Board result for the academic year 2020-21 for Class X was 86% and for Class XII was 92.73%. School has done well in comparison to the other schools of the country. For this academic session, school has executed two goal-setting exercises till date for Periodic Test I and Periodic Test II. Targets were revised taking into consideration the analysis of the marks scored by each learner in the Periodic Test I. The syllabus for Term I was completed by 25 September 2021. School has also organized parallel classes for Basic and Standard Mathematics to provide personalized attention to learners and increase the overall percentage for Mathematics.

Well-being Initiative

To strengthen the symbiotic relationship between the teacher and the taught, the school had initiated, during the time when students weren't on the fort, an endeavour geared towards meeting the social, emotional, and academic needs of students and the expectations of the parents. A team of counsellors comprising **Ms Niharika Kulshrestha, Ms Divya Verma and Mr Kamlesh Singh** led this initiative. This is an ongoing exercise.

Workshops

A Yoga Workshop for teachers titled - The Immunity Booster Programme, was organized by the Art of Living team on 'How to deal with Stress' during the times of the pandemic. The online programme was spread over three days, from 11 June - 13 June 2021.

Faculty members attended the webinar 'COVID and YOU, by **Dr Soumya Swaminathan**, Chief Scientist - World Health Organisation on 12 June 2021 as a part of the NIIT University's ongoing 'Learn from the Masters' webinar series.

Faculty members attended the 'Creativity for all- Level 2 Adobe Creative Educator (ACE)' training session conducted by Adobe on 23 July 2021 to expand their teaching toolset, integrate creative

projects into their curriculum, and drive key student outcomes.

A TRANSFORMATIONAL JOURNEY

'It takes a village to raise a child'. I am sure at sometimes in our lives we must have needed that helping hand, guiding force and a calm mentor, who could help us ride the ever changing wave of parenting the Z generation. I remember some where in 2017 while my child got back from school, a reputed day school of my city, he was exhausted, dull, and lacking the zeal of a youngster. He seemed busy with academics but not happy achieving those goals alone. We as parents were trying to manage his academics and co-curricular activities to help him have an all-round development. However, it wasn't going as planned, he became irritable and started facing weight issues, leading to reduced self-esteem. Since I am a follower of a life changing philosophy, I prayed fervently for my son's happiness and support from the environment. That very year I got to witness a program conducted by the boys of The Scindia School in my city and got an opportunity to interact with the teachers of the school, which further solidified the idea of sending my ward to The Scindia School. I felt as if my prayers have been answered in this form. Till this day we haven't regretted the decision even for a minute.

Initially the ride was not a smooth one, home-sickness, new environment, new food, new people and an absolutely new lifestyle. It's truly not easy to step out of our comfort zone and adapt to our new lives. However, he always got immense support from his teachers. The trained staff members of the school were strength pillars not just for the children but also in counselling the parents, towards the right ways of leaving the reins and trusting our kids towards independent living.

It's a big leap of faith when you turn your back to leave a part of you, into hands you have just heard of. I still remember meeting my son after 1 month of his stay, his transformation was noticeable. He had started to like the place and had made friends. I dropped off a plump pampered boy, and the one I met had grit, fire in his belly to take charge of his health and life. Within a few months I could see positive changes in my ward like his determination to try out new skills, improved focus, and his grit towards becoming a better version of himself. With every passing year he began to shine like a diamond, and I saw all the rough edges being smoothed. We witnessed a perfect all-round development in him, over the years. It was tough to believe and imagine how a closed environment with huge cultural diversity could provide a strong value system to be grounded to. This is where I got the best surprises from the school. I was amazed to see the ethical and moral values imbibed in these children. From the power of meditation to prayers, religious significance, importance of festivals, they thrive to internalize a value system that makes them into responsible young adults. A generation that will be ready to respect and lead the development of a compassionate society.

I once read a quote "raising a teenager is like living with a bowling alley in your head". So true, you really can't predict, how many pins will fall, with which conversation and when you hit that perfect strike. Raising a teenager is a subtle art and the experienced minds of Scindia have nailed it for years.

While we wanted him to take risks, we were worried about the safety, while we wanted him to be open minded, we wanted him to have a grounded strong value system. Parenting young adults of the current generation, is definitely a challenging task. One thing that we learnt in the journey was, that experience is the best teacher. With experienced guidance across sports, public speaking, academics, multiple activities to build interpersonal skills and great opportunities for leadership responsibilities, the school environment provided everything needed for the important teenage years. Today he stands tall, as an independent, balanced and open minded, responsible adult, with his own analytical abilities to take risks and move towards a knowledgeable future.

In the words of - Ella Fitzgerald. "It isn't where you came from. It's where you're going which counts." Today I am so grateful that we chose to be a part of the Scindia fraternity. I genuinely believe that The Scindia School treasures every child by preserving their uniqueness and cherishing them to blossom in all areas of their lives. The values taught at the school keep the children grounded and connected with their traditions. This indeed was one of the best decisions in our lives and has changed my son's life for the better. With lifelong memories that my son made over the course of his stay, and the wonderful independent adult we saw our teenager transform into, my deep gratitude to the Scindia fraternity, we will truly be indebted for your unwavering support always.

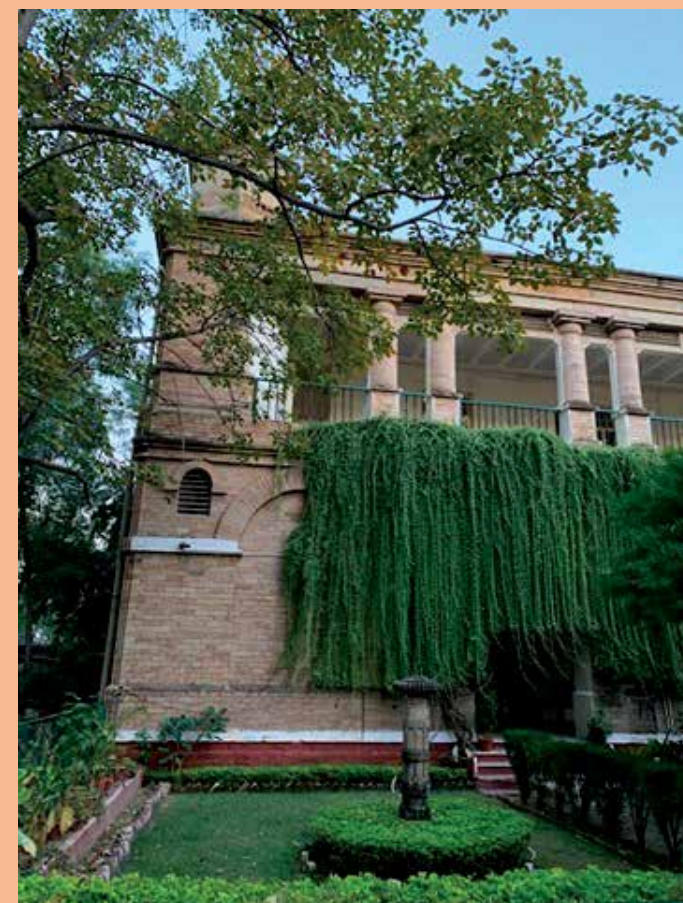
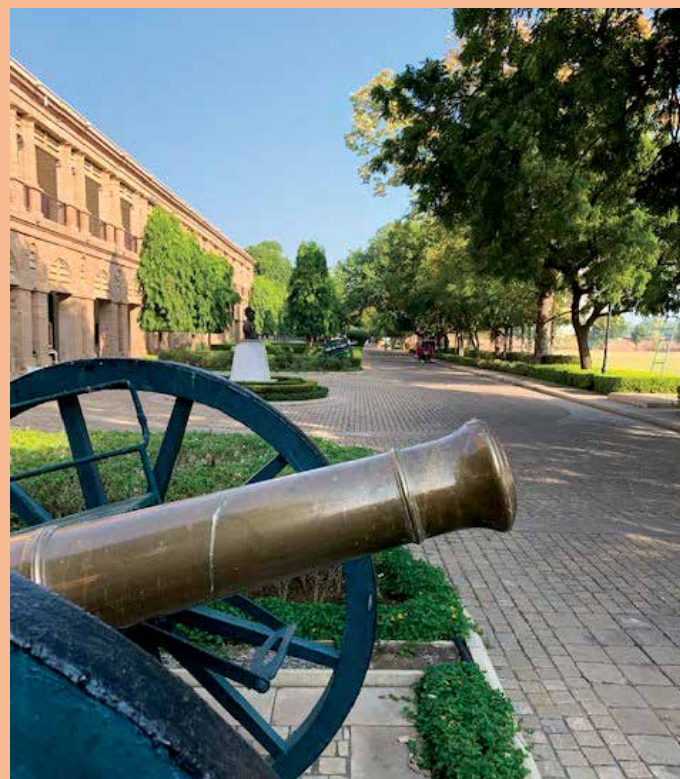

THIS WAS ONCE HOME. IT WILL ALWAYS BE THAT!

I was 9 when my parents sent me to study at The Scindia School, an institution established as the Sardar's School 124 years back. My father was also an alum, and so, when Kolkata became a difficult place to live in, with the Naxalite movement, he decided that I would be better off at Scindia. I hated the first term. I was fat and was teased endlessly.

Home for the first vacation, I refused to go back. Dad and I had a long chat, and it was decided to give it another shot. There was no looking back. I was still fat. But I figured out how to overcome that. The easier way was to 'get punished' and be made to run rounds of the cricket field, to lose weight. But I hated the thought. So, I decided that I would try and excel in areas where fat boys stood a chance. Debating, dramatics, elocutions... in sports, as a goalkeeper, or fielding in the slips, or being an opening batsman, were methods I resorted to. Fortunately, I excelled in those.



Having been recognized as someone who had talent, made the vacations bearable. I could not wait to get back to school. Eventually,



I was appointed as a school prefect. I was house captain when my residential house (Ranoji) won the General Efficiency Shield against all odds (raiding the tuck shop, having two boys expelled for ungentlemanly behavior and similar stuff). What made this achievement more special was that Ranoji House achieved this distinction in 1972. The only time before that was in 1944, when my father was the house captain of the same house.



I graduated and the years passed by. I visited Scindia only once or twice in the next 30 years. Then a call from an ex- Scindian changed all that. **Rajendra Pawar** was the Vice President of the school's Board of Governors and had got my number from another person. Mr Pawar, or Raji, as he is referred to, is also the Founder of NIIT Ltd – India's first computer education company, which was set up close to 4 decades back. He is also the co-Founder of the non-profit NIIT University, located in Neemrana, and a Padma Bhushan.

"Will you help drive the marketing and communications for the school", he asked?

I said that I would love to. (You don't say no to a Padma Bhushan awardee:-). And for almost the past two years, I have been visiting Scindia again and again. In fact, I now have an added responsibility. I am the Director – Alumni Relations for the school.



It has been an emotional experience for me, not just because the school, and the fort on which it is situated is home to the #1 boys' residential school in India – but it is also a place which is possibly safer than home, safer than any day school, with a dynamic curriculum aimed at holistic development of the boys even in these trying times. As my mother says even now, "Atul, I lost you when you were 9. You became independent and never asked us for any help or guidance in any decision you made."



I would like to say this to her on a public platform. "Ma, you and dad gave me not one but two homes. Scindia is one of them." At the time of writing this, I am at one of these homes. I am at Scindia. It is a beautiful place, as the pictures will vouch for. But these pictures will never tell the full story. Of the soul of Scindia, which resides deep within me.

In Conversation with

Mr Dipak Haksar (Ex-Md, 1976)

Keenly perceptive and steeped in a sound value system, Dipak Haksar, former Chief Executive Officer, ITC Hotels, brings a dexterous touch to work ethics and business strategy.

With a GMP from Cornell University, he began his journey with the ITC Maurya and held various portfolios in the organization over the last 40 years managing both leisure and business hotels. His dynamic leadership has not only won him many professional accolades but also earned him the respect of industry peers. He was the Chairman of both ASSOCHAM and CII National Tourism Committee on Tourism & Hospitality.

Mr Haksar has always believed in the Indian value system. He is a firm believer that all tourism industry stakeholders must align their goals towards a larger sustainable agenda. One which is aimed towards protecting the environment, respecting local cultures, beneficial to local communities and conserves natural resources.

A man of many facets, he enumerates the mantras that have been his guiding beacon - the virtues of Passion, Perseverance, Patience, Commitment and Discipline. A strong believer in Vedanta, he credits this philosophy for guiding him through his professional and personal evolution.

While in school, he was the School Prefect, Football Captain, Basketball Captain, earned Colors in Hockey, Football and Athletics & won the Cariappa shield. He attributes his alma mater of being the perfect place, from where he drew many of his life's lessons from the time he spent in the school.

We present before you a candid conversation which our staff editor Mr Vishesh Sahai had with him.

Q What is that you like most about ITC?

As a lifer, having joined at a pupil stage, ITC has had a profound impact on my life. It is one of the rare organizations that invests heavily in employees preparing them to respond to the changing dynamics and complexities of business and competition. It imparts knowledge and prepares you for each job position and there is a both, transitional and succession plan that enables your growth in the organization. The adage 'people are the most valuable assets' and the 'best growth comes from within' are truly exemplified by ITC.

Q What are the three words you would like to use to describe yourself?

It is difficult to describe oneself and I feel reluctant to say something about myself which could stereo type me in a particular way. Application of knowledge to find solutions to problems, resolve conflicts and make the world a better place is what education must do.

Q What do you look forward to as a member of the Board of Governors?

It is a privilege to be a member of the Board of Governors of your alma mater. It brings a sense of responsibility to contribute to the decision-making processes that will help the school to navigate through the challenges that it confronts in the 21st century. As a member, it will be my endeavour to share my experiences and understanding in the hope that decisions taken will help the school to become - India's best and Globe's finest.

Q What is the biggest challenge you overcame in your professional career, and how?

ITC hotels was at a cross road on how it should reposition itself and deliver experiences and the questions we asked ourselves were – What is our belief? What values were core to the business. As we were building bigger, better and luxurious hotels, the management had to decide the course that we should take. Should we take only the green route or should we focus on luxury. In the rebranding exercise, we undertook 'Responsible luxury' as the core of our business philosophy. That was in many ways a defining moment for us. To take two incongruent words, 'responsible' which means to conserve and reduce; and 'luxury' which means indulgence, excellence, and excesses was a difficult task. How do you blend the two concepts – luxury and sustainability & sensitize the rank and file towards this ethos and build experiences that deliver the brand promise was indeed a challenge! ITC Hotels blended the two and pioneered the concept 'Responsible Luxury'; integrating world class luxury with 'green best practices' to enable planet positive luxury experiences for guests. Blending contemporary green practices and luxury was indeed challenging with no precedents to emulate. Our mantra was to deliver experiences around this idea through eco-embedded products, eco-easy service design and eco-sensitized associates. Responsible luxury's relevance in today's time is undeniable, with eco-responsible practices at the helm of the agenda for both individuals and corporations. The fact that the concept gained acceptance and recognition by our guests and the global community at large, is evident in the many accolades that we have garnered since its inception. It is indeed a matter of great pride for us to be recognized globally as the 'greenest luxury hotel chain' and that we surpass international benchmarks on energy, water conservation, waste efficiency and carbon emission reduction; this is now a Harvard case study. Today ITC hotels with its trademark 'Namaste' symbol is committed to deliver on its

ethos of 'Responsible Luxury' with globally benchmarked services embedded in a culture deeply rooted in India's rich traditions and hospitality.

Q Having travelled extensively, what are some of your most profound lessons personally and professionally?

On a personal note, I found it amazing to recognize that we live in an interdependent and connected world and this thought has been further strengthened by the recent 'global pandemic'. Due to our mental constructs, we perceive nation states, cultures, religions, ideologies, and people as differentiated and independent. However, when we go deeper, we realize that these differences are at best superficial if not illusionary. Swami Vivekananda sums it up beautifully - "All differences in this world are of degree, and not of kind, because oneness is the secret of everything." On the professional front I noticed while I was engaging with professionals at Cornell University, where students had come from across the world, that the many challenges and problems that they were facing, were at different stages in the evolution of that continent and country. When we discussed issues, we realized that with collaboration and sharing of knowledge and resources, one could find answers to many issues and challenges facing us, as somebody or the other had experienced it in their learning curve. It was all about sharing and adapting knowledge to that particular situation and finding answers to solve it in the most optimum manner. This brought about a realization that the world could solve so many of its issues without wasting time and money and instead the savings could be deployed for improving the standards of living and wholesome education particularly in the developing economies.

Q What is that you absolutely love about your school?

There is a lot that I love about the school, but I think what stands out is the sense of history that you get when you arrive at the *Urvai gate*. As you climb up the *ghati*, and you see the huge carved statues, your education starts right there. What I loved most about my time in school was the freedom to express and grow in an environment that encouraged you to be the true expression of your own unique talent. We were ably supported by our wonderful and committed teachers, great infrastructure, spartan upbringing and the values that were imparted to us through the unique culture and traditions of 'Scindia'.

Q Any message from your side for our students.

The year gone by has been full of challenges. Pandemic disrupted our life and caused immense hardship and uncertainty to our everyday existence. It is perhaps a time to pause and reflect on our learnings, to think about innovative solutions to preserve the finite resources of the planet; to realize that we live in an inter connected, collaborative and boundary-less world where technology, innovation and AI are changing the way we respond and make choices. This will keep you focused on the things that matter in a fast-changing world. Quoting Steve Jobs – "Your life is limited, so don't waste it".

In my journey of more than 40 years with ITC, I have been guided by ideals and principles that have inspired me and have been integral in shaping my career over the years. My council therefore to all of you today is –

- 1. Life is full of character-building experiences** – being focused and thoughtful at every step of the way will help to achieve the truest expression of your life. The cultivation of virtues of integrity, courage, honesty & sincerity is a lifelong endeavor. Our character is constantly formed by the choices we make in our life.
- 2. Do not seek success.... instead seek excellence and you will find both. Do the very best you can and leave the results to take care of themselves. There are no shortcuts to success** – it can only be achieved through hard-work, determination, and perseverance.
- 3. Watch your actions, they become habits** – watch your habits, they become your character – and watch your character for it becomes your destiny.
- 4. Making the right choices comes from developing inner strength** – learn to listen to the voice that guides you.

5. Do not fear failure – often the greatest strength and courage comes when you fail. Remember failure does not mean that you are not good.

6. Lastly remember that change is the only thing constant. We fear change the most – but when you stop changing, you stop growing. Embrace change for a better you and a better future.

Build a strong foundation while you are in Scindia school to become responsible citizens and leaders of tomorrow. Care for the planet, care for the environment around you, build a better world which is better than how you found it. 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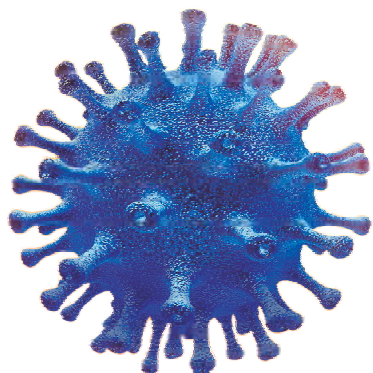
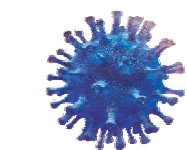
