He was awarded not only with an individual prize, the rolling trophy of Nanhi Chhaan for the school but also a check of 30,000 rupees that he can donate to any NGO of his choice. The 28th JTM Gibson Debates and Quiz 2023, organised by Mayo College, Ajmer, concluded on 1st October 2023, with **Arnav Joshi** from our school receiving the prestigious 'Best Speaker' award. Following a fierce battle of wits in the quizzes, our school's quiz team successfully secured a place in the finals.

Founder's Day Practice



Practices for the Founders' day began to take place after lunch, earlier this month, exhibitions and escorting practices were already in progress. A team of experts from Sumeet Nagdev Dance Arts joined hands with the school, to prepare the students for the grand event. Students were selected and accordingly segregated for dramatics, dance, vocals, instrumentals, and aerial arts. Attention to detail was given major priority for the event to be simply perfect. Models from wood-work, Metal-Work, Paper-Mache and clay modeling departments were made for display. The pressure on everyone was quite high to represent the school in front of reputed dignitaries, old boys, guest schools and their own parents. The practices were also witnessed by the royal family.

The first printed edition of Review was published in the year 1941. Before that the Review was humble sheet of Fort News meticulously pasted on the soft board in 1937.

1. TUCK SHOP

November 1941

The long-awaited tuck shop finally opened, and it had brought hope to the students. Mr Phatak, who used to overlook the tuck shop, had stocked it with a variety of small items, such as sharpeners, pencils, pen holders and small notebooks. This was very useful, as Mr Pande did not give out pencils and erasers easily. So far, the tuck shop only had food items such as biscuits, toffee and chocolates. However, it is hoped that cold drinks will be added soon. Some students are so excited about the possibility of cold drinks that they would have danced if they could.

2. JEEVAJI GYMNASIUM OPENED

January 1942



The school year's inaugural function was held on Founder's Day, which was held on 14th December 1941. H H Maharaja Scindia and his royal guest, H H Maharaja Rana of Dholpur.

The distribution of special prizes received by students over the previous academic year was done by H H Maharaja Rana of Dholpur. He clicked a button that opened the blue and white drapes that had been drawn across the building's entrance. The Jeevaji Gymnasium was inaugurated.

3. ESTABLISHMENT OF MADHAV HOUSE

February 1942

There are two main reasons why the new House was being started:

There was no more room in the Junior Houses and many junior boys had come to join the school.



There were two groups of boys - one under 10 years of age and the other over 10 years of age.

The new House had 12 boys under 10, and it could easily accommodate 6 more. There is not enough furniture in the House yet, but everything will be supplied soon. The beds were arranged in rooms, with 6 beds in each room. The common room was decorated with pictures made by the small boys. It is believed that the name of the new House will be Madhav House.

4. BOYS BANK AND TUCK SHOP

August 1942

A boy's bank started this year to relieve the Housemasters of the burden of keeping the boys' accounts. The boys' money will be safe in the bank, and they could write checks and withdraw money as needed.

The tuck shop, which was started last year, had been very successful. It was always opened and sold biscuits, toffees, ice cream, pencils, erasers and notebooks. If a boy lost any essential goods, he could get them from the tuck shop.

5. OPENING OF THE SCHOOL CINEMA

July 1948



The School bought a 16 mm projector along with a microphone, lens and a silver surfaced projection surface. This had brought the culture of watching movies to the school and made all the students extremely joyous. This also gave birth to a movie recommendation

club in the school. The students enjoyed two movie a month due to this.

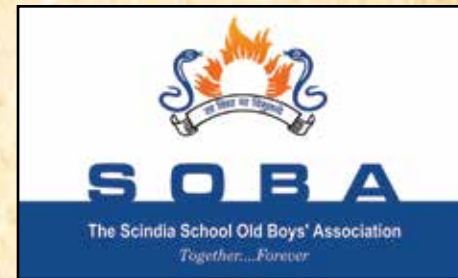
6. GIRLS JOINING THE SCHOOL (DAY SCHOLAR)

October 1948

Permission was sought and granted to enable the Master's daughters to study in the school. So far, five girls have joined the school. This practice continues till date.

7. BIRTH OF SOBA

October 1948



Mr Natwar, an Old Boy, wrote to the then editor of the Review that the Review is the only link between the school and the boys who passed out and there is no strong connection. He felt that there should be an Old Boy's association and thus, the idea of SOBA was born.

8. VISIT OF SARDAR VALLABHBHAI PATEL

December 1948



Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, the Deputy Prime Minister and Miss Maniben Patel with H H The Maharaja Scindia and Ministers of Madhya Bharat Government visited the school on the morning of 5th December morning. Sardar Patel spoke a few words to the boys who had assembled on the hockey field.

9. A REVIEW OF THE 'REVIEW'

February 1949

Since 1939, We used to have only one copy of the Review which was handwritten. It was put up on the notice board near the stairs leading to Madhav Hall. Every week this changed, and a little

crowd collected around the board. It was a bit hectic. So, in 1940, Mr. McMullan published copies of the review for each student, which was printed in the school itself in the A.D. press.

10. MAHILA MANDAL

February 1949

Under the auspices of the School Social Service League, a very useful beginning was made to organize meetings of servants, wives and children every Sunday and it was called the Mahila Mandal meeting. The sheer purpose of these meetings was to keep a check on the sickness of the servants' children, teach elementary hygiene to mothers, give pre-natal advice and post-natal advice to

mothers and learn to make them sit and sing songs and tell stories and make their children learn new games.

11. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE HEALTH CENTRE

March, 1949

The health centre was inaugurated in the March of 1949 by H H Maharani Vijayaraje Scindia. She also gave a speech in inaugural event where she thanked the school and motivated the students at the school.

Edition No. 93, 31st July 1950

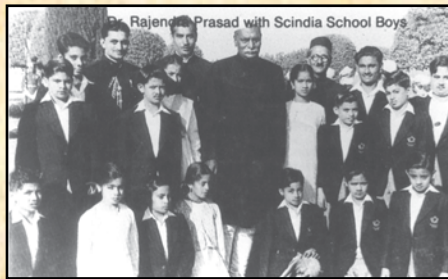

6. PIANO DONATED

Edition No. 180 & 181, 6th December 1955



H H Maharani Scindia donated a piano for the Assembly Hall. It is still a part of the school's Assembly Hall. It dates back to the time of the Second World War (1939-1945).

7. VISIT OF INDIRA GANDHI

Edition No. 199, January 1955

Ms Indira Gandhi visited the school and addressed the assembly as a politician. She inspired the young minds and was



greatly impressed by the atmosphere and tone of the school.

8. 200TH EDITION OF THE REVIEW

Edition No. 200, 15th February 1957

The school Review completed 200 editions of the review. This showcased the consistent efforts of the editorial team and the staff editors in publishing the Fort News and giving freedom of expression to the students of the school.

9. SHIFTING OF THE TUCK SHOP

Edition No. 222, 31st August 1958

The tuck shop permanently shifted to the Madhav Pavilion from where the boys could buy their desired items.

10. ADDITION OF AN EXTRA TIER

October 1953



An additional tier was added to the Astachal structure for accomandating increasing number of boys in the school.

In the year 1962, the school underwent more changes than in any period of its history.

2. NEW HOUSES INTRODUCED IN THE SCHOOL

Edition No. 286, 6th November 1962

In the year 1962, the school had undergone more change than in any period of its history. We saw the addition of three new Houses for the Seniors and then the shifting of the old Junior Houses to the North Block.

3. INTRODUCTION OF ISC EXAMINATION

September, 1963

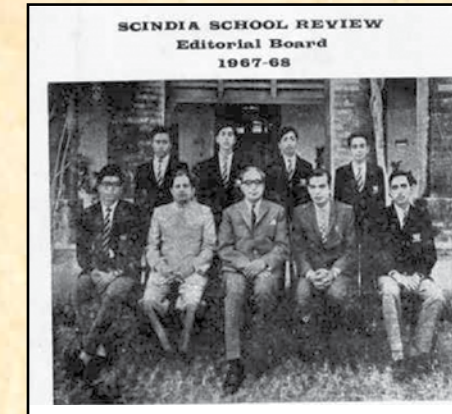
The Senior Cambridge Examination would no longer be held. Instead, the ISC Examination would take its place. More staff members were added for the same.

4. MAHARANI TAKES OVER THE BOARD

After Maharaja Jiwaji Rao as our patron, Her Highness the Maharani of Gwalior carried out the responsibility of taking over the board with deftness. The then editor wrote, 'Where we had lost, we have gained, where we have failed, we have won'.

5. FIRST EDITORIAL PHOTO

Edition No. 357, 21st October 1967



After three hundred editions of the Review, the editorial board had their first official picture with Princial Mr J.L. Dar.

6. CONSTRUCTION OF ASSEMBLY HALL

December 1967

In the year 1967, the construction of assembly hall was proposed by the school council. It was accepted by the council and that lead to the construction of our current Assembly Hall.

7. OPENING OF THE MUSIC SCHOOL

December 1967

The school consisted of a proper storeroom for musical instruments and other allied appliances, and quite a spacious, soundproof, and ultra-modern auditorium that could accommodate more than two hundred people sitting Indian style. The music department could boast of possessing a hall that was one of the best in any school in the country. This building was a boon to the music department, which had for a long time felt the need for a separate place of its own where students could practice music on different instruments without disturbing other students pursuing their activities in the school at the same time.

Lastly, as the in-charge of this department, Mr. M. C. P. took this opportunity to express his deep gratitude to Mr J. L. Dar, the Principal, for his generosity and kind help in every matter concerning music, and particularly for his untiring efforts to make the department self-sufficient. He was also deeply indebted to H H Rajmata, Rana and Rani Pashupati Shamsheer Jung Bahadur, and Col. Shri Brijraj Narain, and others who were in the audience.

8. WE LOST CAP. GURMEET SINGH DHILLION

Edition No. 277, 15th March 1962

We lost our beloved Old Boy Cap. Gurmeet Singh in an air crash who was then recognized as a Madhav awardee of our school.

9. THE SCHOOL SUFFRED ANOTHER LOSS

Edition No. 311, 1st August 1964

We suffered the death of H H Maharani of Tripura the daughter of H H Maharani of Gwalior after whom a memento was made in the Padma Sarovar.

10. OLD BOYS ROPOSED FOR EAST INDIA SOBA

Edition No. 319, 1st March 1965

Deep Chandra Bothra who later donated the school basketball court wrote a letter to the Principal proposing for formation of East India SOBA. After, he saw a reunion at the Howrah Station.

11. GEN. CARRIAPA AND JUSTICE SEN VISITED THE SCHOOL

Edition No. 320, 15th March 1965

Gen. Carriapa and Justice Sen visited the school. They interacted with the boys and found out the working and schedule of the boys.

12. FAREWELL OF MAHARAJA MADHAV RAO SCINDIA

Edition No. 274, 1st February 1962



The school bid farewell to the young Madhavrao Scindia who had gone to Winchester College in England for further studies. Mr. Shukla accompanied him to England.

13. CANCELLATION OF FOUNDERS DAY DUE TO NATIONAL

EMERGENCY

Edition No. 286, 6th November 1962

Founders' day was not celebrated in 1961 for obvious reasons, and at the time of writing this it was not sure whether the boys would be able to celebrate it this year either, the reason being the state of emergency declared in the country.

14. THE CHANGE IN SPORTS T SHIRT

Edition No. 385, 1969

In the school council meeting, Nitin Shah proposed that T shirts should be worn during games time instead of shirts. The decision was left to the master InCharge of games. This proposal likely reflected an effort to enhance comfort and practicality for students during physical activities while aligning the school's sports attire with modern trends. The decision-making process within the

school council showcased a commitment to considering and accommodating students' suggestions and evolving preferences in matters related to school regulations and attire.

In addition, the proposal for Inter House Indoor Tournaments was kept.

15. THE ATTENDANCE REGISTER FOR ASTACHAL

Edition No. 386, 1969

The attendance register for Astachal should be maintained for the senior school was to be maintained according to which an absent mark would lead to a 10 paise fine. This measure likely aimed to encourage regular attendance and punctuality among senior school students.

1. NEW FEATURES OF MORNING ASSEMBLY

Edition No. 399, 15th August 1970

Two noteworthy new features were added to the morning assembly this term. The assembly began with a recitation of a prayer in Sanskrit, which was then rendered into English as well. (This tradition is followed till date.) On Tuesdays, a short talk on the life story of some great spiritual leader was given after the assembly song.

2. FIRST TUCK SHOP MEETING

Edition No. 399, 15th August 1970

The first meeting of the Tuck-shop Committee for the year 1970-71 was held in the Madhav Hall on August 5th, 1970. The following decisions were taken:

The tuck shop would open on Sundays from 9:30 am. The list of requirements from each House should reach the Secretary at least one day in advance so that things could be kept ready for collection by the representatives from each House.

Coca-Cola would not be a Tuck-Shop item in view of the problem of cooling, storage, and the large number of bottles to be kept track of. The boys should get Coca-Cola in their respective Houses.

3. STATE GOVERNMENT APPROVES SCHOOL FOR BOARDS

Edition No. 412, 1st August 1971

The School had received approval from the State Government to prepare boys for the Central Board of Secondary Education.

4. A BOXING DISPLAY WAS ARRANGED

Edition No. 436, 1st March 1973

A boxing display was arranged in the



school gymnasium on the evening of 24th February. Among the senior groups, Tulaji Angre was adjudged the best boxer and Pawan Kaula the best loser. Among the juniors, Chetan Koradia was adjudged the best boxer and Anil Metha the best loser. Other winners in their respective weight groups were Deepak Haksar, Vinod Dube, Sanjay Shinle, Rajiv Kathpalia, Shouvik Roy, Jagdish Bhandia, and Sujit Chaudhari.

The school was grateful to Brig. Pandey, Commandant of the B.S.F., Tekanpur, who kindly arranged for the coaching of the boys in boxing, and to Col. Rampal Singh, Deputy Commandant, and other officers from the B.S.F. for their assistance in kindly judging the boxing display.

5. THE STAGE WAS SET

Edition No. 437, 15th August 1973



The School Labor Council decided to construct a raised platform on the OAT for the play during the Founder's Day celebrations. It was appreciated by the administration.

6. 7TH AND 8TH CLASS ADDED TO SENIOR HOUSES

Edition No. 454, 1st August 1974

A major change in 1974 was the dissolution of the Middle-Houses. Three Houses that formerly housed boys of

classes VII and VIII had now been added to the Senior Section. A general shuffle-up had resulted in distributing the boys of classes VII and above, in the nine Senior Houses.

7. S.P. SAHI RETIRED

Edition No. 510, 1st August 1978



Shri S. P. Sahi retired as Principal of the School on 30th June, 1978. Dr. S. D. Singh of the Doon School was appointed to succeed him as Principal. However, Dr. Singh was only able to join on 5th August, so Mr. Sahi officiated for him since the school reopened after the summer vacation on 17th July. He formally handed over charge to Dr. Singh on Monday, 7th August.

8. THE INDIANNESS OF THE SCINDIA SCHOOL

Edition No. 515, 21st October 1978

An article on page one:

A public school is usually described as the abode of good education and as the haven where modern, westernised, cultured specimens are manufactured. So far as the first expression is concerned, the Scindia School qualified it. But the latter concept did not at all apply to the Scindia School. It was a school that tried in every way to inculcate in the students a deep feeling and association

with their Indian heritage and to revive and sustain in them the manifestations and magnificence of Indian Culture. The very word SCINDIA contained a greater entity within it—INDIA, which constantly reminded the students that they were Indians first and Indians last.

Very few schools gave so much importance to auspicious days like Gandhi Jayanti and Martyr's Day, and to festivals like Ganesh Chaturthi and Janmashtami, besides others, as the Scindia School did. Most other schools would declare a holiday on these days, but it was perhaps only the Scindia School that involved the students so much with the Ganesh Chaturthi and Janmashtami celebrations. On Ganesh Chaturthi, there were long sessions in the Assembly Hall where the students were told stories about the life and legend of Lord Ganesha, and they also participated in various bhajans and devotional songs. On Janmashtami, the school celebrated the birthday of Lord Krishna with great pomp and grandeur. There were special prayers, bhajans, and dance performances. The students also dressed up as Krishna and Radha, and there was a competition for the best costume.

The Scindia School is a unique institution

that sought to combine the best of both worlds. It provided its students with a world-class education, but it also instilled in them a deep sense of Indian pride and culture.

9. BLUE T-SHIRTS WERE INTRODUCED IN THE SCHOOL

Edition No. 516, 15th November 1978

Sanjay Ahuja proposed that the boys should be supplied with sky-blue T-shirts instead of white for games, or else white T-shirts should be supplied with "SCINDIA" printed on them. This proposal was accepted. However, blue T-shirts would be supplied after the stock of white T-shirts in the Clothing Store was finished.

10. THE SCINDIA SCHOOL CAFETERIA

Edition No. 519, 15th February 1979

It was a dream come true: what had been thought to be impossible all these years had become a tangible reality! The idea of The Scindia School having a Cafeteria had at last materialized on 8th February. The idea had taken root in Dr Singh's

mind only a month ago, and this term things had really begun to move. The Principal, along with the Cafe Committee consisting of the Bursar, Mr Acharya, Mr Bedi, Mr. Dhir, Mr Bhradwaj, Mr Khan, and the School and House Captains, had weighed the pros and cons, and finally, Mr Starr had been appointed the manager and requested to run the cafeteria.

1. PAYING THE BEST IN THE NATION

Edition No. 537, 1st August 1980

The teachers' association organized a grand dinner on Thursday 7th July at the Staff Club. The governing body of the School for the Substantial Increase in the Teachers' Emoluments. There was a feeling of jubilation among all the employees of the school as there was a substantial increase in their emoluments. The school's teaching staff was perhaps now the highest-paid staff among the public schools in the country.

Instead of the loosely hung all-blue T-shirts the boys had previously, they now had the school color blue and white t-shirt worn with blue shorts. The masters on duty also were asked to wear all whites. The fields now look attractive and bright in turn out.

3. END OF AN ERA

Edition No. 543, 15th November 1980

In keeping with the highest democratic traditions, Shrimant Rajmata Vijayraje Scindia, despite the request from the members of the Boards of Governors to continue, decided to resign from the Presidentship of the Scindia Education Society and the Board of Governors, which office she had held with much grace, distinction, and success for nearly 20 years, in her place, Shrimant Madhav Rao Scindia was unanimously elected president of The Scindia Education Society and the Boards of Governors. During Raj Mata Sahiba's tenure of the office as President of the Board of Governors, the school took large strides, quick and firm on the path of progress and became a premium public school of this country.

4. WOODEN CHAIRS TO STEEL CHAIRS

Edition No. 545, 1st February 1981

During the holidays in the past, the school's woodwork and metalwork departments collaborated to craft an additional 150 steel chairs with teak-wood seats and backs. This endeavor aimed to upgrade the seating arrangements within the school. Specifically, it resulted in the replacement of all the old wooden chairs in the classrooms situated on the ground floor of the school building with these newly constructed steel chairs. This initiative not only improved the durability and aesthetics of the seating but also enhanced the overall learning environment within the classrooms, ensuring students' comfort and providing a fresh and modern look to the school's facilities.

5. INSTALLATION OF ELECTRIC PUMPS IN KHAMBA TAL

Mr Rajiv Gandhi on 7th November Inaugurated the newly installed SOBA Computer Center, the Air-conditioned Pale Green Room of Beads and Greens, which housed the two PCI Action stations. The school is thus introduced to new technology and marks the beginning of the new computer era. The school is one of the first schools in the country to introduce computers to its students.

9. ART INTRODUCED TO THE SCHOOL

1. THE NEW SCIENCE BLOCK

Edition No. 652, 29th October 1990



The New Science Block at The Scindia School was the result of years of planning and dedication. It was initiated by Mr J. L. Dar and Dr. Singh, with the support of Maharaja Madhavrao Scindia and a generous donation from an alumnus, Mr V. K. Modi, with the aim of providing advanced science education to the school's students. It was situated adjacent to the school building, offering picturesque views of Astachal and Moti Jheel. The Science Block had three well-equipped laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, and Biology, each accommodating 60 students, along with classrooms and lecture theaters. Project-based learning had been emphasized, and classes from XI to XII would be held there. The facility had also housed the Computer Department and Electronics, promoting interdisciplinary learning. The Science Block's central teacher's cabin had allowed for supervision and student interaction. A Science Library had been planned for further resources. The facility had facilitated collaborations with visiting scholars and institutes, enriching scientific education. With its inauguration on the 93rd Founder's Day by the President of India, Shri R. Venkataraman, the Scindia School had aimed to become a prominent name in school-level science education.

2. INTER-COM SYSTEM INTRODUCED

Edition No. 654, 15th February 1991

To save time and bring in more efficiency, all important places in the school, like Houses, Guest House, Offices, Mess,

Security gates, Junior Section, etc. All of this is related to the Uptron Inter-com network. Nearly forty points in the school can now communicate with each other on this system.

enhancing their overall experience and convenience. The positive response from the Old Boys further affirmed the school's efforts in providing practical and appreciated updates to its uniform and clothing options.

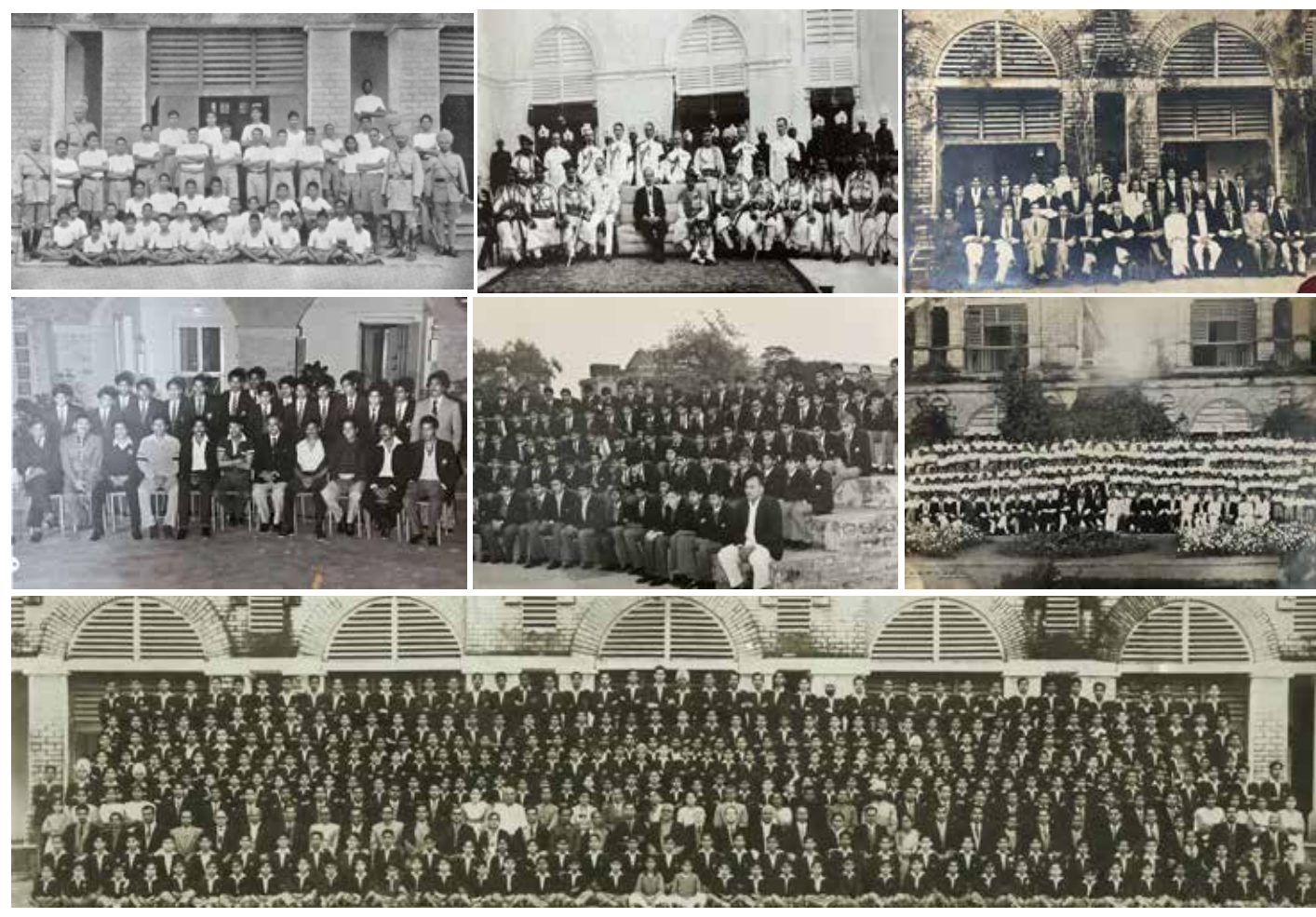
**14. NEW PEDESTRIAN-

Diversity - The Essence of India

Do you know when you're filling out a form and it asks for your nationality? You automatically scroll to the Indian tricolour and as you click it you hear the voice of every single person who was animated by this culture before you, and the weight of the world entombs you in the existential dread of living through the incredibly nuanced and messed up concept of India. Maybe that's just me.

Then I click submit, and instantly I am a million kilometres away in a Bombay high-rise, the scent of the ocean indiscernible mixed with my stress-induced perspiration.

I type this on a borrowed laptop, on borrowed time from people lost to history who probably deserve to talk about this subject more than I ever will. Huddled up in my Bombay high-rise, even in the firing of my neurons I taste the grit of Bombay air, the salt spray, and the spatter of hot oil. When I lie down at night, I explore the familiar avenues of my city; churches, Goan bakeries, Tamil fast food joints and Gujarati corner stores fit themselves like pieces of a jigsaw puzzle as I travel

these endless alleys. In this amalgam of languages and cultures, I place myself, a mark in a sea of change. It's easy to lose yourself in the chaos. Born to a Gujarati family in Bombay, who bought at the right time, with enough to school both their children in a Cambridge board school and raise them in English, I hold the world in my hands and yet I am the farthest from understanding my place in this world.

The blood of the covenant is thicker than the water of the womb and I lack the taste for both.

Diversity does necessitate equity. In a city where the contour of privilege puts mountains and valleys to shame, I was born into privilege, in the soft sheets of a hospital close to home, in the absence of worry. Diversity is in our blood, a nebula of clashing colours united by the intangible spirit of India. Diversity does not guarantee harmony nor tolerance. Diversity is as bloody as it is beautiful.

The bus reaches my stop, I pull out a single coin and utter a single word, twenty minutes later I've reached. I often spend time around Fort; a colonial-era district spread like open

arms across the ocean. My Bombay belongs with the Irani cafes and newspaper vendors, in every glass of Badshah's faluda and every college vada pav. My eyes are trained to discern mandirs from mosques, from churches to derasars, from the eyes of a believer to those who wish they could. In commercial districts, caste, creed and kin are embossed into its very fabric. Even in the most desperate of times, people are sorted into mental divisions, prejudice comes back tenfold although swept under a rug. Yet, the city prevails. In a game of colours and combinations, languages ooze and religion greases the wheels of the world; India is as dazzling as ever. Like a lotus in a muddy pond, people are of the world not from it; the ever-enticing vines of British-born xenophobia, colourism and colonial hardship-induced mistrust all fail to trap the common person.

Our differences unite us, street lamps flicker, the sky is but a haze of amber. Bombay is a city of a million different creeds, the air a cacophony of a hundred languages, but none of us sleep.

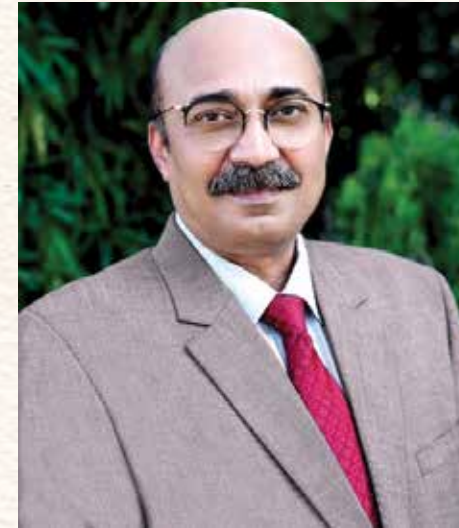

श्री राज कुमार कपूर (अधिष्ठाता, सूचना प्रौद्योगिकी विभाग, सिंधिया स्कूल) के साथ।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता : आप अपने बारे में और अपनी शिक्षा-दीक्षा के बारे में कुछ बताइए?

श्री राज कुमार कपूर: वर्तमान में मैं सिंधिया स्कूल, ग्वालियर में आई.सी.टी. के डीन पद पर कार्यरत हूँ। मैंने विश्व भारती विश्वविद्यालय, शांति निकेतन से विज्ञान स्नातक (गणित), बिजनेस एडमिनिस्ट्रेशन में डिप्लोमा, कंप्यूटर अनुप्रयोगों में मास्टर और मास्टर ऑफ साइंस (एप्लाइड मैथमेटिक्स) किया है।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता : सिंधिया स्कूल में रहते हुए आपको किस प्रकार के अवसर प्राप्त हुए?

श्री राज कुमार कपूर: मुझे सी.बी.एस. ई. बोर्ड परीक्षाओं में अपने छात्रों के उत्कृष्ट प्रदर्शन के लिए भारत सरकार से प्रशंसा-पत्र भी मिला है। मुझे कॉलेज और विश्वविद्यालय स्तर पर उनके शैक्षणिक प्रदर्शन के लिए राष्ट्रीय छात्रवृत्ति मिली है। मैं सिंधिया कन्या विद्यालय प्रबंधन के नामित सदस्य और सिंधिया स्कूल, ग्वालियर में स्कूल प्रबंधन समिति का सदस्य (शिक्षक) भी



हूँ। मुझे सी.बी.एस.ई द्वारा जेईई (मुख्य) के लिए पर्यवेक्षक तथा सी.बी.एस.ई द्वारा ही मुख्य परीक्षक के रूप में भी नियुक्त किया जा चुका है। मैंने अंडमान और निकोबार द्वीप समूह में पी.ए.डी. आई. से स्कूबा डाइविंग कोर्स में भाग लिया, डोडी ताल ट्रेक करने के लिए छात्रों के समूह का नेतृत्व किया और पातालसू पर्वतारोहण अभियान, मनाली का सदस्य रहा।

मैंने वुडब्रिज स्कूल, यूके में एक्सचेंज टीचर प्रोग्राम में भाग लिया। मैंने भारत में बर्क ले द्वारा "शिक्षा क्षेत्र के लिए धन संग्रहण" पर संगोष्ठी व 'माइक्रोसॉफ्ट द्वारा आयोजित शिक्षा प्रशिक्षण भागीदार शिखर सम्मेलन', इंडियन हाईस्कूल, दुबई द्वारा आयोजित "इंटरनेट नैतिकता" पर क्षेत्रीय राउंड स्क्वायर सम्मेलन, वेलिंगटन कॉलेज यूके द्वारा आयोजित ग्लोबल सोशल लर्निंग (जीएसएल) 2016 के कार्यक्रम व डॉ. केंग द्वारा "आत्म-प्रेरित छात्र: विकासशील 21वीं सदी का नेतृत्व" पर आईबीएससी जैसे संगोष्ठियों में भाग लिया।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता: कंप्यूटर के अलावा अन्य किन क्षेत्रों में आपकी रुचि है?

श्री राज कुमार कपूर: टेबल टेनिस और क्रिकेट में राज्य और विश्वविद्यालय स्तर के टूर्नामेंट जैसे कई खेल मैंने खेले हैं। विद्यालय में होने वाले फुटबॉल मैच में कई बार मैंने गोल कीपर तथा क्रिकेट मैच में विकेट कीपर की भूमिका निभाई है। मैं नेहरू पर्वतारोहण संस्थान, उत्तर काशी से प्रशिक्षित पर्वतारोही भी हूँ।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता: जब आपने कंप्यूटर पढ़ना शुरू किया होगा उस समय भारत में यह प्रारंभिक अवस्था में था। आपको यह विषय पढ़ने के लिए किस ने प्रेरित किया?

श्री राज कुमार कपूर: माता-पिता और शिक्षकों ने मुझे इस क्षेत्र में अपनी उच्च शिक्षा प्राप्त करने के लिए प्रोत्साहित किया और फिर मेरी भी इस विषय में रुचि बढ़ने लगी।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता: सिंधिया स्कूल में कंप्यूटर के क्षेत्र में काम करने पर आपको

किस प्रकार की चुनौतियाँ आती हैं और उनका सामना आप किस प्रकार से करते हैं?

श्री राज कुमार कपूर: सिंधिया स्कूल में कंप्यूटर 1984 में ही आ गया था। तब से आज तक इसने बहुत बदलाव देखे हैं और यही बदलाव चुनौतियाँ लाती हैं। सिंधिया स्कूल में कंप्यूटर के क्षेत्र में काम करने के दौरान, मुझे कई प्रकार की चुनौतियाँ आती हैं। पहली चुनौती है, तकनीकी तरीके से तेजी से बदलते तकनीकी माहौल का सामना करना। कंप्यूटर विज्ञान जगत में नए नए विचार हमेशा ही आते रहते हैं, और मुझे इस तेजी से बदलते माहौल में कदम रखने के लिए तैयार रहना पड़ता है।

दूसरी चुनौती है सीखने की तत्परता और ग्रहण करने के तरीके का बदलते दृष्टिकोण। कंप्यूटर क्षेत्र में नए तकनीकी अपडेट और टूल्स बार-बार आते रहते हैं, इसलिए हमको निरंतर सीखने के लिए तैयार रहना पड़ता है और उन्हें समझने के लिए तत्पर रहना चाहिए।

तीसरी चुनौती है सहयोग और संचालन कौशल का महत्व। कंप्यूटर क्षेत्र में काम करते समय, हमें कई बार टीम के साथ काम करना होता है, और सहयोग कौशल और टीम वर्किंग कौशल बहुत महत्वपूर्ण होते हैं। मुझे यह सुनिश्चित करना पड़ता है कि हम सभी मिलकर काम करें और समस्याओं का समाधान निकालें।

इसके अलावा, सिंधिया स्कूल में कंप्यूटर क्षेत्र में काम करते समय, मैं नैतिकता और नैतिक मूल्यों का पालन करने का भी प्रयास करता हूँ, ताकि मैं जिम्मेदारी और ईमानदारी के साथ काम कर सकूँ।

स्कूल प्रबंधन की भागीदारी और प्रतिबद्धता के बिना परियोजना सफल



नहीं होती। हालांकि यह एक लंबी यात्रा है और कई और मील के पत्थर हासिल किए जाने बाकी हैं।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता: सिंधिया स्कूल में कंप्यूटर के इतने बड़े "सिस्टम" को आप किस प्रकार चलाते हैं?

श्री राज कुमार कपूर: हमारे पास विशेषज्ञों की टीम है जो इन सबकी सहायता करती है और छात्रों को सिखाती है कि कैसे इन्हें प्रयोग करना है। प्रमुख चरणों में, हम कंप्यूटर को चलाने के लिए निम्नलिखित कदम उठाते हैं:

स्थापना और नेटवर्क कनेक्ट: पहले, हम कंप्यूटर सिस्टम को सही तरीके से स्थापित करते हैं और उन्हें स्कूल के नेटवर्क से कनेक्ट करते हैं।

ऑपरेटिंग सिस्टम चयन: हम अभी विद्यालय की आवश्यकताओं के हिसाब से उपयुक्त ऑपरेटिंग सिस्टम का चयन करते हैं, जैसे Windows या Linux।

सॉफ्टवेयर स्थापना: हम छात्रों को शिक्षा देने के लिए आवश्यक सॉफ्टवेयर को स्थापित करते हैं, जैसे कि MS Office, ग्राफिक्स सॉफ्टवेयर, और अन्य शिक्षा संबंधित एप्लिकेशन।

संक्षेप में, सिंधिया स्कूल के कंप्यूटर सिस्टमों को चलाने के लिए हम उन्हें पेशेवर तरीके से प्रशिक्षित करते हैं, ताकि छात्रों को व्यावहारिक शिक्षा प्राप्त करने में सहायता मिल सके।

साक्षात्कारकर्ता: शिक्षा के क्षेत्र में कंप्यूटर के प्रयोग को किस प्रकार बढ़ाया जा सकता है?

श्री राज कुमार कपूर: शिक्षा सामग्री के डिजिटलीकरण: कंप्यूटर के माध्यम से पाठ्यक्रम, पुस्तकें, और अन्य शिक्षा सामग्री को डिजिटल रूप में उपलब्ध कराने से छात्रों को यह आसानी से प्राप्त हो जाती है।

ऑनलाइन शिक्षा: कंप्यूटर और इंटरनेट



का सहयोग लेकर ऑनलाइन शिक्षा को बढ़ावा देने से छात्र दुनिया भर में विभिन्न विषयों के लिए उच्च शिक्षा प्राप्त कर सकते हैं।

स्वर चित्र शिक्षा: कंप्यूटर के माध्यम से छात्रों को विज्ञान, गणित, और अन्य विषयों को समझने में मदद मिलती है।

शिक्षकों के लिए सहायक: शिक्षकों को पाठ योजनाएँ बनाने, छात्रों की प्रगति की मॉनिटरिंग करने और परीक्षा प्रबंधन के लिए कंप्यूटरीकृत साधनों का उपयोग करने में मदद मिलती है।
